'Kidnaped' Plane Under Lock And Key

BROWNSVILLE, Tex. (UP)—A company official was stymied yesterday when he tried to recover U.S. Overseas Airline's "kidnaped" DC-4 transport plane.

Alfred L. (Pappy) Conklin, chief pilot for the airline, showed up to

claim the big craft.

But Lloyd A. Webb, 31, of Bayside, N.Y., who flew the plane from Oakland, Calif., to Brownsville because he said he wanted possession of his 25 per cent interest in it, had the big fourengined craft under lock and key.

Paul Y. Cunningham, attorney for Webb, told Conklin flatly he couldn't have the plane until the company makes a settlement—by buying the 25 per cent Webb owns and another 25 per cent owned by Webb's partner. Also the company must pay an estimated \$150,000 rental Webb claims is owed him, the lawyer said.

The New Yorker grabbed the giant aircraft Saturday shortly before it was to be flown on a cargo haul to the Pacific. He said he only took his one-fourth share, and the one-fourth share of his partner, Earl Clements of New York.

Unfortunately, he said, the half owned by the airline had to come along.
