Downtown Miami Flying Strip Urged by Detroit Air Leader

> "We have battled long and hard for new facilities, and we did acquire land in the northeast section where an airport could serve 2,000,000 people instead of the relatively limited number now accessible to Wil-

low Run. But we lost out by a single vote in the City Council.

"I hope Miami succeeds in getting a downtown landing strip before it is too late. You have one fine, large airport here, but it is so loaded it is difficult to get into it and out again."

Packer, whose Florida home is at Hillsboro Beach, was introduced by an old Air Force friend, Col. Varley Young, now a Milami merchandising counsel.

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
