At the River of Life, however, there is no regard for position, gender, ethnicity, appearance or faith. Everyone is welcome and all services are free of charge.

Every day 300 to 400 people visit the River of life Mission seeking and finding a meal, a shower, a change of clothes, a prayer...a friend. They refer to them as guests of the River of Life Mission and since 1985, whatever their need, the Mission has been a friend to them.
