

# Air Cargo Firm Will Resume Service Between Isles Soon

Air Cargo Hawaii Inc. will resume its interisland cargo service "in the near future," but will proceed cautiously because of a possible "over-capacity situation here," according to Robert W. Hall, president.

The company had to wait 14 months before the Civil Aeronautics Board approved the common control and interlocking relationships of the three companies he heads, including Robert W. Hall Associates Inc., doing business as Hawaii Air Cargo, and Transportation Services of the Pacific Inc.

The CAB also has approved Hawaii Air Cargo's application to become an air freight forwarder (consolidator).


In about two weeks Hawaii Air Cargo will take over the services which have been provided to

local retailers and other businessmen by the Hawaii Air Cargo Shippers Association Inc., but there will be no change of rates or service, Hall said.

The main reason for discontinuing the non-profit association's activities was the difficulty of raising investment capital. "We had to face the economic realities with regard to financing," he said.

Freight forwarders, known as "container stuffers" in the industry, move consolidated shipments on scheduled airlines, and normally do not operate their own aircraft, Hall said.

"The economic waste has been horrendous," he said regarding the 14-month wait for CAB approval.
