

MIAMIAN WILL FLY TO AVIATION MEETING

Yonge To Go To Washington In Gar Wood's Airplane; Several To Attend.

Flying in the specially built Fairchild monoplane owned by Gar Wood, J. E. Yonge, chairman of the city aviation board, will leave at 7 a. m. today for Washington to join the group to represent Miami at the International Aeronautical Conference tomorrow, Thursday and Friday, called by William P. MacCracken, jr., assistant secretary of commerce for aviation.

In Washington representing Miami will be Mr. Wood, Glenn Curtiss, one of the first commercial builders of planes; J. J. McKay, attorney, and W. D. Pawley of Miami. Mr. Wood will fly to Washington from Detroit in another airplane.

The Fairchild monoplane will be piloted by George Cobb, Mr. Wood's private pilot, and probably will bring Mr. Wood back to Miami. The monoplane was flown here by Mr. Wood several weeks ago and was used by him in gaining a student pilot's license after an examination by Leo C. Wilson, department of commerce aircraft inspector.

Delegates from countries in all parts of the world have come to the United States to attend the conference, which will deal with aeronautical developments in the past and will discuss future international handling of airplane movements.

Miami is particularly interested in the conference due to the linking through Miami by Pan-American Airways of the countries of North, South and Central America and the West Indies, Mr. Yonge pointed out. The All-American Air Meet January 7 and 8 and the opening of the Pan-American lines to Nassau and Porto Rico January 9 will be brought before the conference.
